Cannabis Testing

Oral Fluid Testing CH., THC

Neither test looks for the presence of CBD, nor any of the other ~500 chemical compounds found in marijuana.

Cutoff Levels

What?

A level at which the concentration of a substance in your urine or saliva indicates a safety risk

Why?

- Ensures employees are fit for duty
- // Eliminates possibility of testing positive from secondhand exposure
- // Holds all people tested to the same expectations

Positive Result



Concentration in saliva/urine = to or above cutoff level

Negative Result



Cannabis Authorizations

Concentraion below cutoff level

Medical authorizations for cannabis do not equal a prescription

Cannabis does not have a Drug Identification Number from Health Canada

Medically authorized and recreational cannabis still impair and therefore pose a safety risk

Second-hand Exposure

Poppy Seeds: Will I test positive for opiates?



Second-hand Smoke: Will I test positive for cannabis?



Cutoff levels are set in such a way to be high enough to avoid these types of results (false positives)

Impairment





Consumption of drugs or alcohol increases the risk of impairment. Risk of impairment is highest in moments after consumption. Risk gradually

decreases from here.
